



Collection Spotlight: Bibles from Alur to Zulu at Westminster College

Did you know Westminster College has an extensive collection of Bibles in translation ranging across the globe? Mostly published from the 19th to mid-20th centuries, this collection ranges from Welsh to Syriac and is an important record of the history of Bible translation and scholarship in this period.

Highlights of this collection are Bibles in 50 languages from across Africa, which the Amaning family donated to Westminster in memory of Revd. Robert Buick Knox in the 1980s.

Over the summer, our CTF library work experience assistant Sophia has worked on a project to clearly classify and label the Amaning donation of Africanlanguage Bibles. They are now much easier to find in the library.

Sophia reports on her experience

As part of my work experience at the Cambridge Theological Federation, I was asked to label a collection of African Bibles that had been donated so that they could be classified correctly at Westminster College library. What I enjoyed about this job was that it was fascinating to see how the text was translated into lots of different languages for each separate book, as the collection came from a time period when biblical texts were being made more accessible to people who did not speak English. The Bibles themselves were also relatively old, so they looked interesting and historic, which made them more appealing to work with compared to more modern books. It was also nice to get an inside perspective on the work that goes into all the different types of classification systems in libraries, and how books are sorted based on their subjects and kept in order in different ways depending on which library is holding them. Overall, this experience has taught me about some of the historical context of Christianity and about the various ways of managing books when they are kept in libraries.
