
The CTF's year in books 2023-24

In total the CTF library team has catalogued nearly 1150 new books this year - including over 700 print books and 400 ebooks:







Behind the scenes of reading lists....

Every module has a Live Reading List, but have you ever wondered what goes on behind the scenes to get them up and running?

Every summer, the library team updates and maintains every Live Reading List. We update the lists with new books requested by tutors, adding links to books where they are available to read online or in a CTF print library.

We also check through every single existing link on the reading list (a lot of clicking!) to spot broken links or places where resources have been moved - as online resources tend to do!

We hope that by the time teaching starts, we have weeded out all the broken links and made the readings lists as easy to use as possible - but if any escape us, please do email us to let us know, and we'll fix them as soon as we can!

Updating our curated reading guides

The CTF has 1000s of ebooks on all sorts of theological topics (and much more besides) - it can be hard to know where to start reading!

To help navigate our ebook resources, over the last few years, we have put together some subject-specific reading guides on contemporary theological issues from ecotheology to new perspectives on Biblical Studies.

These guides offer resources both for those looking for introductory reading, and experts looking to see what's newly available in the library.

We are currently updating these guides to make them more accessible for use with screen readers, and easier to read on mobiles and tablets. Check out our newly updated guides (with more to come):
